

Harbour Canadian Dividend Fund (Class D units) September 26, 2019

Subject to obtaining all necessary regulatory and securityholder approvals, CI Investments Inc. proposes to merge the fund into Sentry Growth and Income fund (to be renamed CI North American Dividend Fund) on or after November 22, 2019. What does the fund invest in?

This fund invests mainly in a diversified portfolio of Canadian common stocks that are paying a dividend or are expected to pay a dividend and, to a lesser extent, in high-yield preferred shares and interest bearing securities. The fund may only invest a maximum of 30% of its assets (book value) in foreign securities.

The charts below give you a snapshot of the fund's investments on August 31, 2019. The fund's investments will change.

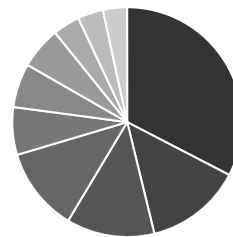

How risky is it?

The value of the fund can go down as well as up. You could lose money.

One way to gauge risk is to look at how much a fund's returns change over time. This is called "volatility".

In general, funds with higher volatility will have returns that change more over time. They typically have a greater chance of losing money and may have a greater chance of higher returns. Funds with lower volatility tend to have returns that change less over time. They typically have lower returns and may have a lower chance of losing money.

Risk rating

CI Investments Inc. has rated the volatility of this fund as **low to medium**.

Generally, the rating is based on how much the fund's returns have changed from year to year. It doesn't tell you how volatile the fund will be in the future. The rating can change over time. A fund with a low risk rating can still lose money.

Like most mutual funds, this fund doesn't have any guarantees. You may not get back the amount of money you invest.

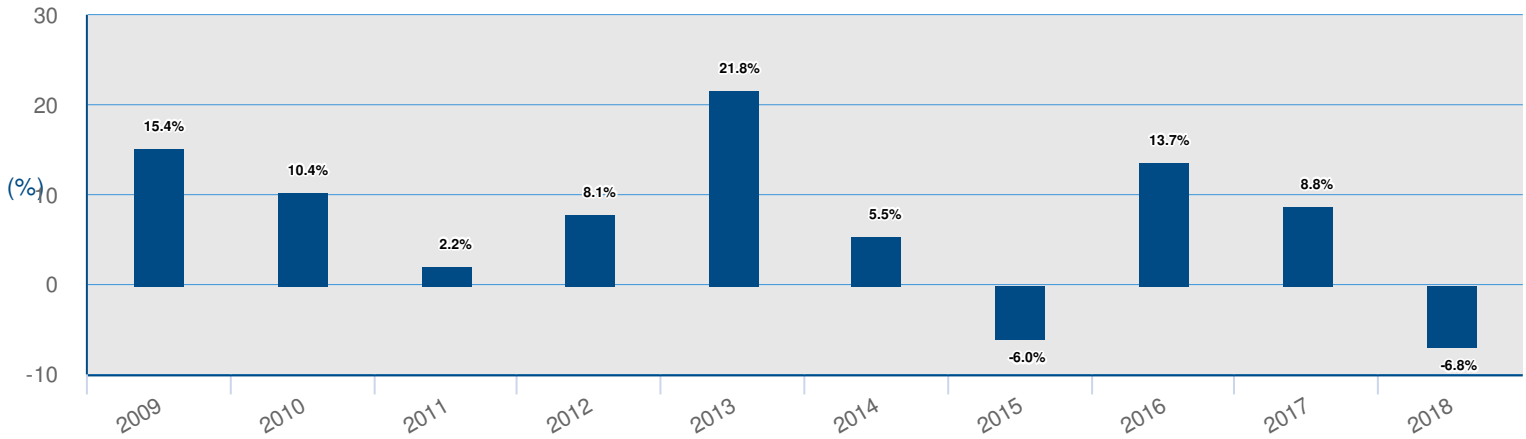

How has the fund performed?

This section tells you how Class D securities of the fund have performed over the past 10 calendar years. Returns are after expenses have been deducted. These expenses reduce the fund's returns.

Year-by-year returns

This chart shows how Class D securities of the fund performed in each of the past 10 calendar years. This fund class dropped in value in 2 of the last 10 calendar years. The range of returns and change from year to year can help you assess how risky the fund has been in the past. It does not tell you how the fund will perform in the future.



Best and worst 3-month returns

This table shows the best and worst returns for Class D securities of the fund in a 3-month period over the past 10 calendar years. The best and worst 3-month returns could be higher or lower in the future. Consider how much of a loss you could afford to take in a short period of time.

	Return	3 months ending	If you invested \$1,000 at the beginning of the period
Best return	20.1%	May 31, 2009	Your investment would be \$1,201.
Worst return	-8.0%	December 31, 2018	Your investment would be \$920.

Average return

The annual compounded return of Class D securities of the fund was 7.7% over the past 10 years. If you had invested \$1,000 in the fund 10 years ago, your investment would now be worth \$2,092.

Who is this fund for?

This fund may be suitable for you if you:

- are seeking current income balanced by the prospect of capital growth
- are investing for the medium and/or long term
- can tolerate low to medium risk

A word about tax

In general, you'll have to pay income tax on any money you make on a fund. How much you pay depends on the tax laws of where you live and whether you hold the fund in a registered plan, such as a Registered Retirement Savings Plan or a Tax-Free Savings Account.

Keep in mind that if you hold your fund in a non-registered account, fund distributions are included in your taxable income, whether you get them in cash or have them reinvested.

How much does it cost?

The following tables show the fees and expenses you could pay to buy, own and sell Class D securities of the fund. The fees and expenses — including any commissions — can vary among classes of a fund and among funds. Higher commissions can influence representatives to recommend one investment over another. Ask about other funds and investments that may be suitable for you at a lower cost.

1. Sales charges

You may pay a sales charge when you buy Class D securities of the fund.

Initial sales charge	0 to 5.0% of the amount you buy	\$0 to \$50.00 on every \$1,000 you pay	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> You and your representative decide on the rate. The initial sales charge is deducted from the amount you buy. It goes to your representative's firm as a commission.

2. Fund expenses

You don't pay these expenses directly. They affect you because they reduce the fund class' returns. As at March 31, 2019, the total fund class' expenses were 2.24%. This equals \$22.40 for every \$1,000 invested.

	Annual rate (as a % of the fund class' value)
Management expense ratio (MER) This is the total of the fund class' management fee (which includes the trailing commission), administration fee, and Certain Fund Costs.	2.03%
Trading expense ratio (TER) These are the fund class' trading costs.	0.21%

More about trailing commission

The trailing commission is an ongoing commission. It is paid for as long as you own the fund. It is for the services and advice that your representative and their firm provide to you.

CI Investments Inc. pays the trailing commission to your representative's firm. It is paid from the fund's management fee and is based on the value of your investment.

3. Other fees

You may have to pay other fees when you buy, hold, sell or switch securities of the fund.

Fee	What you pay
Short-term trading fee	Up to 2% of the net asset value of the securities you redeem, if we determine that you have engaged in inappropriate short-term trading, which may occur if you sell or transfer your securities within 30 days of buying them. This fee goes to the fund.
Transfer fee	Your representative's firm may charge you up to 2% of the net asset value of securities you switch to another fund.
NSF cheque fee	There is a \$25 charge for all cheques returned because of insufficient funds.

What if I change my mind?

Under securities law in some provinces and territories, you have the right to:

- withdraw from an agreement to buy mutual funds securities within two business days after you receive a simplified prospectus or Fund Facts document, or
- cancel your purchase within 48 hours after you receive confirmation of the purchase.

In some provinces and territories, you also have the right to cancel a purchase, or in some jurisdictions, claim damages, if the simplified prospectus, annual information form, Fund Facts document or financial statements contain a misrepresentation. You must act within the limit set by the securities law in your province or territory.
